Profile (site information)

- Province: Negros Occidental
- Population: 151,000 individual
- No of household: 28,671

Shelter

- No of totally damage houses: 5,069
- No of partially damage houses:17,639
- Debris clearing is ongoing for the barangay level. Major streets are accessible by car, jeep, motorbikes.
- Lumbers and other construction materials like CGI, Nipa shingles, nails are available for a higher price that almost double.

- Need shelter repair kits (srk) and emergency shelter kits (esk)

Evacuation Center

- No of EC: None (people go home to their make shift houses using salvaged materials; others live in their relatives)

Electricity: 5 Barangay Partially lighted; 13 barangay no electric supply; 4 barangay have few solar panels in their community.

Communication

- Mode of communication: Cellular phones, Radio in some areas, Television & Internet in some part of the city with partially lighted areas. (Globe telecoms provide free charging in some designated areas).

Water supply is abundant through piped line, hand pump, well and borehole.

Food Security

- Food ration were done by DSWD, LGU, private sectors, school and church based organizations.
- Minimal increase of food prices in the market.

Sanitization

- The affected population still used toilet in their homes.

Health

- Common health problem: cough, cold & fever.
- 1 case of amputation and minor injuries.
- All health facilities are open

Livelihood

- Fishing community 40% all affected with around 15 million worth of damage. They need to repair the boat and buy fishing equipment. (not included the commercial boat owners).
- Livestock: specially the poultry industry are highly affected.
- Fruit bearing trees are also highly affected.
- They need seeds supplies for rice, corn and vegetables.
- Tourist area like resorts were highly affected (need to repair damage facilities)

Education

- Partially damage building :19 elementary school and 2 high school
- All school classes were resumed.
- Feeding programs are ongoing even before Yolanda.

Note: All people in the shoreline including the small island were evacuated before the typhoon came. And right after the typhoon hit the place, clearing of the main roads were done. Electricity repairs are now ongoing. Major needs are shelter repairs and livelihood assistance.
